The History of Harvest



Harvest Christian Academy was established in 1994 by Harvest Baptist Church with the goal of providing a strong Christ centered educational experience. The school initially began as a kindergarten, and grades 1st through 11th were added for the 1995-96 school year. Their first graduating class was in 1997 consisting of 12 students. The same year, the school was first accredited by the Association of Christian Schools International and has continued to maintain this status, to the present. Continuing to grow, Harvest Christian Academy, maintained operations under Harvest Baptist Church entering into the 2000's. In the year 2006, a pivotal decision was mutually reached by Harvest Baptist Church and HCA, in which Harvest Christian Academy would become its own separate entity from the Church, governed by a school board consisting of parents, still installed today. With the desire

to provide kingdom Education, HCA has, throughout the years, brought forth many achievements in service of the Lord. Harvest has gained distinction through its sports, fine arts, Destination Imagination programs and many other extracurricular activities, such as being nominated for the Betty Buckley award for Excellence in theater in 2019, and winning the football state championship in 2019. Upon the advent of 2020, Harvest established of Harvest Christian Academy Lantana, its first ever satellite campus. Harvest Christian Academy began plans for future relocation in 2017, with the Church selling the building shortly after. After a three year search, The future of Harvest was announced in 2021, with the school relocating to First Baptist Church Keller. Upon the dawn of the 2021-2022 School year, HCA began anew at FBC, continuing their service and ministry to the Lord in a new chapter of Harvest's history.

HCA has quite a bit to offer in the unit of extra curriculars; each pertaining to different interests and ideas. One of the most notable is our very own fine arts department. Theatre, directed by the lovely Mrs. Oxley, has been very busy rehearing for this year's production of Frozen Jr. With the script read-through now complete, the cast and crew has moved on to practice rehearsals as well as costume fittings. Everyone is already putting everything they've got into making this show a beautiful success. It's off to a great start for the theatre team, and we're all looking forward to seeing the final masterpiece. The Honors Academic Team-Speech group, led by our Principal Mrs. Dunning, is opening the year by handpicking their respective speeches, and they will be competing in April's TAPPS State Speech Tournament with those speeches. Students involved in Destination Imagination, conducted by Mrs. Walls, are choosing challenges based on technology; science; fine arts; engineering; and service learning. They are preparing for a competition that focuses solely on these challenges in February. National Honors Society office election wrapped up in the first week of September. 
